WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?



Here is an extract from Lewis Carroll's classic work **"Alice in Wonderland"**As part of her conversation with The Cheshire Cat...

Alice: Would you tell me, please, which way I ought to go from here?

The Cheshire Cat: That depends a good deal on where you want to get to.

Alice: I don't much care where.

The Cheshire Cat: Then it doesn't much matter which way you go.

Alice: ... So long as I get somewhere.

The Cheshire Cat: Oh, you're sure to do that, if only you walk long enough.

I am sure that I have quoted this before in a different context, but it says so much about how we can appear quite committed to moving on without any idea of where we are heading. The header to this article asked, "Where do we go from here?" It could have been a question on the lips of the disciples on Good Friday, or Easter Day, or witnessing Chrit's Ascension back into heaven, or pretty much any of the intervening days between these activities. Perhaps it is a question that should be on the lips of today's disciples who gather in the Methodist Churches around Torbay. It should be considered and answered in the light of the most important event in history the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The resurrection directs us to question what happens when we die? Where do we go from here? While we can take the utmost comfort in our Lord's words to the dying thief on the cross near to His, "This day you will be with me in paradise" we might also consider that the Risen Lord will one day return. On that day he foretold that He will say to some "I never knew you" based on their decisions and lifestyle here and now.

If how we live presently has an effect on everybody's eternal future then the original question "Where do we go from here?" becomes relevant in how we plan for the rest of our lives as individuals and as churches. A quote from the German Theologian Wolfhart Pannenberg insists that resurrection must lead to reaction.

"if you believe it happened, you have to change the way you live."

If we want to arrive at the correct destination then we cannot have the *Alice in Wonderland* mentality that we don't much care and it doesn't much matter which way we go. We must decisively choose to invite Christ into our lives and ask Him for directions. The disciples would find the answer to this question in a commission to go and make disciples as they went. That was the "what" to do next, the "how to do it" came at Pentecost when God empowered His fledgling disciples with Holy Spirit energy and abilities. For us we can view the Resurrection and Pentecost as Christian history or experience them as present reality – you choose.

May the Risen Lord guide you in all things at all times. Shalom,

To build confidence in cycling, CYCLE TORBAY are offering FREE cycling sessions for anyone looking to grow their cycling confidence and develop their riding skills. Aimed at intermediate riders, each 2-hour session is facilitated by a Qualified Cycling Instructor, and offers opportunities for riders to learn how to use safe and appropriate road positioning, increased confidence for riding on roads and how to approach and manoeuvre through various types of road junctions.

Why Easter?

As we wander through Lent towards Easter, I wonder what comes to mind for you. Does the wonder of what Easter means warm your heart? Perhaps, I might invite you to re-read the quotations and to take more than a moment to ponder them. Now dwell with this thought from the liturgy for Holy Communion: "Christ died that we might live, and lives that we might never die."

Perhaps you might risk letting God in and to let Him stir in you a thought or two. Perhaps try something impossible, try to forget you know the story and re-encounter it for the very first time. Give it a go. Stop for a moment and marvel at the amazing and

astonishing love God has for us; the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Take the time to worship with a thankful heart. I close by offering a way forwards this Easter. In the past I have been involved in a project called Find One (F1nd). The idea is simple. We don't try to tell everyone about Jesus. Instead, we Find One. How about we each invite one person, or one couple, or one family to join us on Easter Sunday in Church. There is the chance they might meet the Risen

Jesus. And, if you need to bribe them to come, offer to provide Sunday Lunch for them! St Paul wrote in Philippians 1:15-18 that it doesn't matter that folk might share the Good News of Jesus for the wrong reasons, but simply that the Good News is being shared. Go on, risk it - Find One for Easter.
